

Sabbatical Insight

- Dan Wirtenson -



The sabbatical committee has done a wonderful job of incorporating members of St. Stephen's into Father Jesse's period of rest and reflection. It is both prudent and rewarding for a parish to look back and contemplate the past in order to rejuvenate for the future. The second sabbatical event was a day spent at the Worcester Art Museum followed by a trip to Saint Joseph's Abbey in Spencer. The museum offered parishioners the opportunity to explore priceless works of Christian art and learn about the different ways in which our faith has been expressed in the western tradition from the Medieval through the Renaissance and Baroque periods. It makes one appreciate the time, detail, and strain that went into creating these masterpieces and fosters a sense of deep gratitude for the care and beauty that was put into depicting the major events of our Faith. The portrayals of Christ, the Blessed Virgin and the Saints are incredibly moving. As an art history major I had the opportunity to study this gallery quite frequently; a personal favorite has always been El Greco's *The Penitent Magdalene*, ca. 1580-1585. This painting depicts Saint Mary Magdalene repenting of her sins with her gaze turned upwards to God, tears visible in her eyes. These works stir something deep within us as Christians. The trip to the museum even included an impromptu performance of the offertory by the church choir, in a monastic Chapter House built in Twelfth Century France.

The day continued with a trip to St. Joseph's Abbey, a Trappist monastery of the Cistercian Order. The inhabitants continue to pray the Liturgy of the Hours, canonical offic-

es that frame the day around set times of prayer. We were privileged to be able to participate in Nones, the midafternoon prayer, and to hear beautiful Gregorian chanting. Afterwards we met with Brother Francis, a nonagenarian who has been living at the Abbey for over sixty years. The Abbey is where he lives out his simple life of faith and devotion. The monks at St. Joseph's spend their days in prayer, meditation, and bible reading as well as other endeavors such as brewing beer, making liturgical vestments, and creating their own Trappist Preserves. Brother Francis was gracious enough to answer questions for our group, and it was inspiring to hear his spiritual journey of faith, one which has grown and developed over time. His humility and warmth touched us. The quiet Abbey, tucked away in beautiful surroundings, gives one the opportunity to pause and reflect. It is heartening to know that spiritual communities based on simplicity and the old Benedictine way of life are still able to have their place in this hurried world. The art museum and Abbey gave us the opportunity to explore our Roman roots as a church and the best of the Roman tradition. It will be exciting to follow this up with a closer look at our own Anglican tradition. It reminds us that we are all part of the universal Church of Christ and share in God's gifts of redemption, faith, and hope.

Men's Retreat

Ora et labora, pray and work, was the theme of the men's retreat on May 12th at the Community Harvest Project in Grafton. Led by Fr. Dave Woessner, we lived the monastic life for a day. We prayed at lauds, tierce, and sext. Most of the day was spent in companionable silent reflection. We shared each other's silent space as we cooked and ate our lunch. We experienced new things: previously unheard sounds, an awareness of our surroundings as we walked around the farm and worked to transplant pepper seedlings, and a new closeness to God. We closed with a Eucharist and left in silent reflection. This was a wonderfully moving spiritual experience for all of us.



Legacy Sunday

On Sunday, May 6th we celebrated Legacy Sunday at St. Stephen's. We discussed how a Legacy Gift differs from other gifts given to St. Stephens during the sermon and again at coffee hour. Legacy gifts are generally made through:

- *A Bequest in a Will*
- *A Life Income Gift*, such as a pooled income fund, a charitable gift annuity, or a charitable remainder trust
- *Gifts of Special Assets* (real estate, stock, life insurance, retirement accounts)

We concluded the sermon at both services by asking parishioners to reflect on the inscription on the Legacy Plaque.

Vestry Notes

*June Vestry meeting
was held on
Sunday, June 24.*

After approval of the consent agenda vestry members discussed two opportunities for outreach

1. Summer Movie Night Grant
A Diocesan grant has been received which will allow purchase of equipment to hold Movie Nights in the car-park for out-reach purposes.

2. Food Pantry Update and Outreach Project

David has been in discussion with representatives of the Westborough Food Pantry to develop an outreach program that will start with St. Stephen's hosting a meal for about 25 people on a monthly basis in our parish hall. The Food Pantry will ask invitees from their program to sign up in advance and the Senior Center has offered to bus our guests here and back. St. Stephens would prepare and serve a simple meal using materials supplied by the Food Pantry. We would need to train additional parish members in the food hygiene requirements and classes for this will be available this fall. Outreach planned to start by year-end.

And under Any Other business:

- Repair and Painting of the Church exterior is urgently needed. Some initial quotes have been received and include substantial carpentry work as well as painting. In addition some gutter installation is under consideration. The Property Committee is working on these requirements prior to proposing a plan to vestry and parish.
- One of the large trees behind the church (opposite the altar) has split and is now very dangerous. The Property Committee asked if funds could be made available for its timely removal, based on a very reasonable quote for \$1200. This was unanimously approved.

A reminder that all vestry meetings are open to the public.
